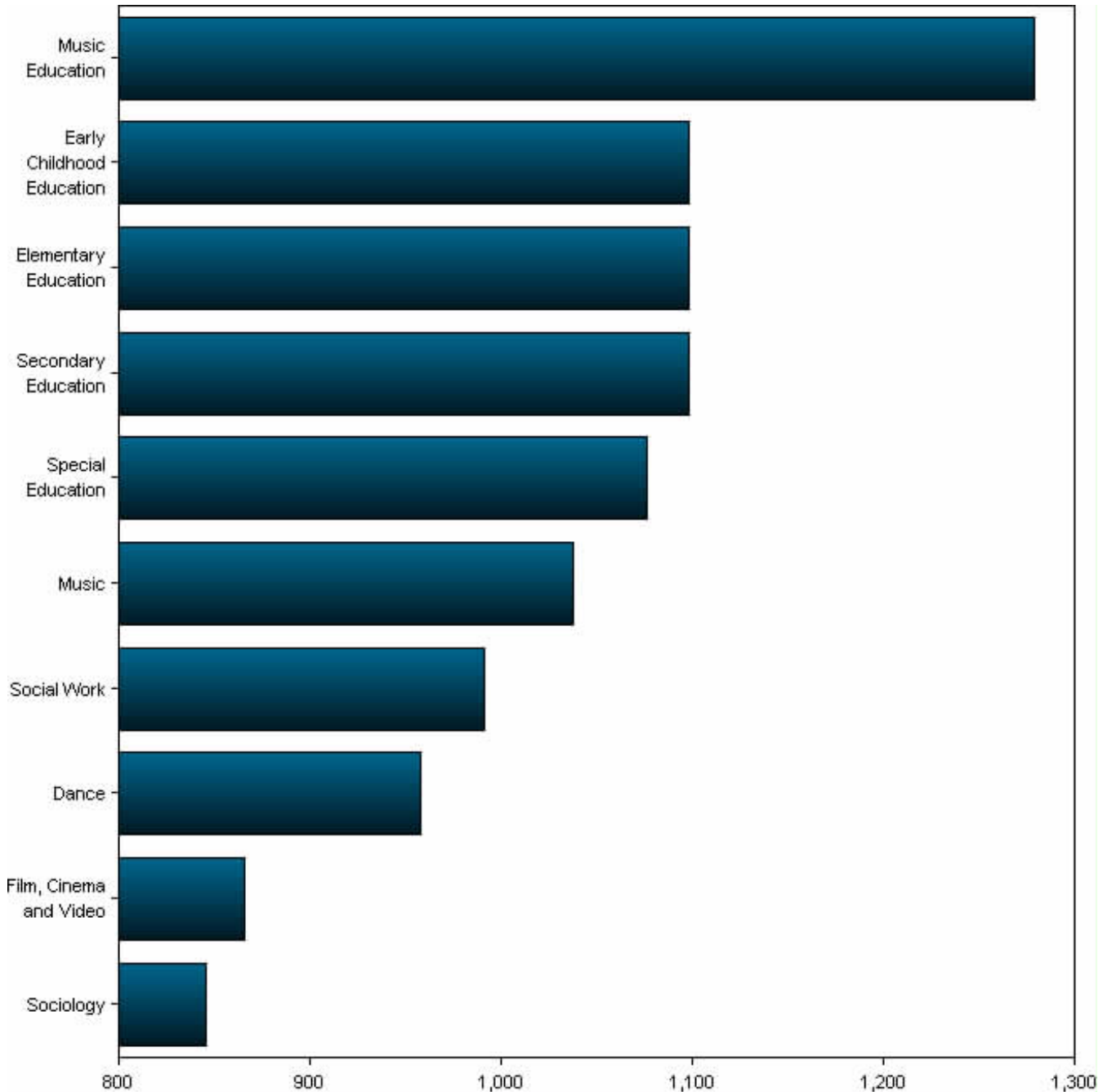

1. Music Education

2. Early Childhood Education

Early childhood development is a major taken by students who wish to work with infants and young children. In order to work with children from birth through to second grade, a student must receive a degree in early childhood development and then become licensed in their state. Licensure in early childhood development allows the student to work in schools, childcare programs or institutional settings. A major in early childhood development will be able to preliminarily evaluate young children to determine if they have special needs such as learning, behavioral, physical or emotional disabilities. Early identification of these problems is critical to the continued growth and development of the child.

Student Profile:

A student who majors in early childhood development must genuinely enjoy working with small children and desire to help them in their growth. Verbal and written communication skills are critical to this major because the student is not only working with the child but with their parents or guardians. This student can be characterized as compassionate, able to motivate children and parents to complete tasks and able to work with all persons concerned with the child in a caring, yet professional way.

3. Elementary Education

Elementary education is a major for people who want to become teachers in an elementary school. Students of this major further concentrate their specialty on either special or regular educational teaching services. Each state has a licensure requirement for teachers. Graduation in this major generally fulfills the requirements for someone to qualify for licensure in the state the university is located in. Although curriculum and instruction graduates take many education courses, they also are generally expected to match these courses with a major in another academic field. Preparation in this major trains the student to design, develop and implement instructional programs. The student will learn the most effective ways to communicate with students so they may learn. The curriculum and instruction major learns about how children develop and learn in order to most effectively teach them.

Student Profile:

Elementary education majors like to work with people, are effective leaders, are good with children age 12 and younger. They are organized, can communicate well and possess the power to motivate people.

4. Secondary Education

A specialization in secondary education leads to certification for teaching at the high school level. In some states this may include teaching at the middle school or junior high school level, as well. Students are introduced to a variety of philosophies and approaches to secondary education through coursework and field experiences and to a wide variety of students from diverse backgrounds. Reflective teaching at the secondary level is important to ensure that pupils engage in maximal educational experiences as they prepare to enter adulthood. Professional educators are needed who are able to meet the challenges presented by a changing society, while adhering to sound instructional practice. High school teachers are certified by the state they wish to teach in. This major generally requires that a student also obtain a major in an academic discipline that is taught at the secondary school level (e.g., Social Studies, English, Biology, Physics or Mathematics).

Individuals in this major have an interest in teaching and continuing their involvement in the area of education. As professional instructors they will contribute to keeping today's children well prepared for the future through education and perhaps a little personal creativity. These people enjoy the prospect of teaching and making as good of a positive impact on their students' futures as possible.

8. Dance

Dance programs provide students with the opportunity to study dance in order to dance as artists, become teachers of dance or to study further as scholars. The field of dance includes training in both traditional and non-traditional dance. While focusing on the development of performers, choreographers and educators, dance programs also encourage the emergence of new, diverse and creative dance techniques and styles. Dance students also enrich the cultural life of the campus and the community. Because dance is such a physically strenuous activity, many dancers retire at an early age. Most dancers desire a college degree in dance in order to remain in the field after they retire. A dance degree is a liberal arts degree usually housed in the college of music, theatre or dance. Although a college degree in dance is not necessary to perform, it is necessary for those who want to teach dance in college, high school or elementary schools. A dance degree also provides a foundation for those who want to develop a career in the arts, but not necessarily perform.

10. Sociology

The study of the structure of society and its enduring patterns of social relations is sociology's primary mission. Sociology studies human conduct from the perspective of the history and the anatomy or structure of the groups. It focuses on how people coordinate their activities to reach individual and collective goals through the development of roles, meanings, and norms that make behavior reciprocally predictable and organized. Sociology investigates questions such as how such patterns of interdependent activity originate and what sustains them, why they take one shape instead of another, how some societies change more rapidly than others, how groups are related to each other, and how people justify and explain what they are doing. The patterns are learned as customary behavior and institutional practices. The sociological perspective is closely linked to comparative historical and cross-cultural studies of social institutions and to psychological studies of human interaction in a wide range of social, economic, educational, religious, familial, and political settings.

Student Profile:

This major is of interest to the individual who is observant of other people's actions when they interact with each other and who is looking for patterns and consistencies in their interaction. This is the primary field of choice. Sociology is the study of this as well as many other aspects of human interaction taking into account things like race, gender, setting, upbringing, etc. The individual who is curious about this will learn many things in this field, and will be trained to use the knowledge gained advantageously.
